Maple Sugarin' with Riveredge Nature Center

Maple Sugaring in Kindergarten by Mrs. Popp:

Last week the Kindergarten class worked with the nature center to learn all about 'Maple Sugaring.' It was a lovely and informative afternoon learning about the process from step one, identifying a maple tree to the final step of enjoying syrup on a pancake and a pickle (thanks to Mr. Picklepuss).

The children especially enjoyed learning about Maple Tree bellybuttons, tasting sap from the tree, helping to drill the tap hole and being invited to lick their plates clean of syrup :)

We've been back to check on our tree, Ms. Maple, everyday since. We listen carefully for sap drops to fill our bucket. We're realizing that being able to tap Maple Trees, and turn sap into syrup, is a special part of living in Wisconsin. Many kids may not know where syrup comes from. So, we've been thinking like procedural writers and using our nature journals to share ideas about the process.

History in 2nd Grade by Mrs. Raimer:



We are walking through history in 2nd Grade! We have built an interactive timeline as we travel through history to explore each event through storytelling. We began with a 84 foot long timeline as a visual representation of North America and that the Native Americans were here for 8,000 years before the Europeans arrived 330 years ago. Then we made our own timelines that will focus on the history of the United States since the Europeans arrived and explore the cause and effects of each important event. We sipped tea as we learned about the Boston Tea Party earlier in the week, and yesterday we chose to become Patriots and fight for Independence from Britain in the American Revolution! Our "You Choose" book sent us on a 12 mile march towards Philadelphia, which was a long 1.2 mile hike for us along the river to the Outpost for our class. We hid behind the stone walls at the Mushroom/Fort Mifflin as the entire British Navy lobbed more than 10,000 cannonballs at us. Defeated, we headed to Valley Forge and made our own shelter.

Although the class survived the British cannonballs, we perished in the harsh winter elements from Influenza. We will continue our walk through history next week as we head west seeking adventure and prosperity.

Third grade has been hard at work on their informational writing pieces, creating biographies of influential people in history and science. Students picked someone they were interested in and became an expert on them by reading and researching in books and online. They spent many class periods taking notes on their person's life and accomplishments, and then transferred those notes into their biography drafts. Each third grader then created a speech with the most important information about their influential person, and practiced it many times. Finally, we were ready to open our wax museum where students WERE the exhibits! Each third grade student embodied their hero with costumes and props, and we were joined by family members and the second and fourth grade classes. The third graders should be so proud of themselves for all the hard work they put into this project and for pulling off such an awesome wax museum! Thanks to everyone who came to help us celebrate all their hard work.

This winter the fourth graders have been up to all sorts of fun. I'd like to share one unit of study we embarked on. In our literacy unit on "Identity" we read a book called "Rickshaw Girl" in which a young lady in Bangladesh caused an unfortunate accident while trying to help her family. She wrecked the rickshaw her father uses to taxi people around, which is the main income source for her family. The story is awesome, and if you want the details please ask your child about it.

We took the opportunity to practice a little bit of design and art by learning about Ragnoli and Alpanas designs which play an important role in the story. Check out the photos to see some of the student creations. We got the chance to hear some regional music as well. Many students enjoyed the sometimes repetitive process of creating and practicing these designs and you may see them popping up on notebooks for the rest of the year.

In addition to this, we have also LOVED the warming temperatures. Being able to comfortably return to most lessons being outdoors has been a boon to our class. Thanks for coming along for the ride! **Rockets! with 5th grade by Mr. Kempf on 3/1:** The weather was finally nice enough, temperature wise and no wind, to allow us to launch our rockets. Although the launcher that I built didn't work exactly like I had hoped, it did launch the rockets that the kids built. They really enjoyed seeing how high their rockets flew (and I really enjoyed that it was warm enough that I didn't freeze when I got wet).

The best part of nicer weather is the chance to stay outside and do more school work outside. Yesterday and today we hiked out to the River Outpost for lunch, recess and guided reading. While running around we found otter tracks through what snow was left. So, today we placed our game camera in hopes of capturing an image of this playful animal.

All last month the kids got to hear about African American heroes and this month they are beginning to explore women in history who've had a great impact on the world. They are also starting to explore poetry, which we'll be reading and writing about more later this month. It's been a great week and it was only Tuesday.
