LEARNING UPDATES FROM CLASSES

Fruits of Fall by Kayla Buser on October 11th:







What a gorgeous day for our amazing Riveredge Program, Fruits of Fall, today! We began our program by meeting up with Ms. Pam and Ms. Bri who told us they lost their friend who wanted to meet us, so we set out for Mayapple Woods to help them find him! When we made it safely across the road, we came upon a sleeping man, who just so happened to be the friend we were looking for. We very gently gave him a shake to wake him up. He popped right up and introduced himself as Jimbo Appleseed, Johnny Appleseed's great, great, great, great-grandson. He then proceeded to tell us about Johnny Appleseed and why his name is so recognizable and why the work he did with seeds was so important.

From there we split into two groups and began observing and noticing some different seed characteristics. We specifically focused on how the seeds traveled. We noticed that seeds like burs stick to things to help them travel, while some seeds like acorns might rely on animals to move them, and seeds from a milkweed plant use the wind to transport their seeds. Next, we began a seed hunt! Each student got a little bowl and hunted for seeds on trails and the surrounding plants. After some searching, we met in our groups and sorted our seeds into the way they are transported. We observed that seeds that utilize wind were more likely to be found in the prairie and seeds carried by animals were found more in the forest.

Finally, we joined our groups together and heard the story about the little red house with no windows and no doors. Then Jimbo Appleseed cut the apple horizontally, revealing a star in the middle. Each 1st grader was initiated into the Apple Club with an apple star stamp using the actual apple as the stamp! After that, each student was given an apple and placed it in the cider press. They used their super strong muscles to turn the crank that helped to break up the apples. When everyone had a turn, Ms. Pam pressed the apples and we saw the apple cider we helped to create! To finish off our program, we each got a small cup of Riveredge apple cider...yum!

Family Sharing Partnership

This school year, ROLES is participating in Family Sharing's weekend **Bags in Backpack** program. In September, 169 meals were delivered to five school districts! Their goal is to have kids concentrate on academics and not food. Each food bag, provided to each child who opts in, contains a variety of food, which may include yogurt, cheese sticks, sandwiches and fruit. All food is provided to children free of charge! Families complete the confidential form (it does NOT collect your email address, only your response) shared in ClassDojo to participate in the program and pick up the bag(s) of healthy food and snacks each Thursday afternoon. Families may opt out at any time by completing the form again using the same code word and entering the decision to opt out in the short answer response.

Tick Checks

Please continue to thoroughly check for ticks on a daily basis. Some ticks carry the bacterium that causes Lyme Disease. Signs and symptoms of Lyme disease can vary from individual to individual, however, it is helpful in diagnosis and treatment if there is knowledge of a tick bite, the location of the bite, and when the tick was discovered. Pond Interactions



Third grade has been jumping into being the guardians of the pond at Riveredge!

We helped Ms. Patricia battle Eurasian Milfoil, an invasive species that is taking over Farm Pond. We worked together to use rakes and our hands to pull the plant out, careful not to break it because any appendages can make new plants! It's important to practice our stewardship and give back to this amazing place that we learn so much from! I think the third graders had a lot of fun doing it too.

Our class also participated in an RNC program called Pond Interactions, which was an awesome culmination of learning that supplemented many different topics we've learned so far this year. Students practiced mapping out biotic and abiotic factors we found at the pond, scooping to find macroinvertebrates, looking at what we found under the microscope and using dichotomous keys and guides to learn more about our discoveries.

River Flow Experiment by Shaun Kempf:

Day one of collecting data for our river flow experiment went really well. The weather couldn't have been more perfect. The kids and I were amazed at the amount of life in the river today. It seemed everywhere we looked we saw crawfish and fish swimming around. Even with all the distractions we were able to collect some really good data.

Tomorrow will be day two of data collection as we get information from another part of the river. I wonder what we'll find.
